It seemed as though every month of 2015 had a new and amazing announcement about hepatitis C. Many more baby boomers and those with risk factors were tested. Multiple new treatments were approved by the Food and Drug Administration. More patients were treated, including those who were "warehoused", that is, waited after the launch of protease inhibitors in 2011 for the more effective direct acting antivirals of today. These rapid changes affect how we do business and our future in unexpected ways.

The staff and Board of Directors have spent the last couple of years investigating the hepatitis C business model and what it meant for our future. Although you now know us as Liver Health Connection, we spent considerable time determining what new programs would propel us into the future, what we should call ourselves because of the expanded programs, and then identifying a mission statement that reflected this new reality.

At the very core of our organization is a desire to help people live long lives despite their liver disease, or to help them achieve a cure from their liver disease. Twenty Years of Saving Lives

In 1995, a small group of patient advocates, led by Ann Jesse, banded together to form Hep C Connection. The idea was simple: use current patients to help new patients understand what was happening within their body due to the hepatitis C viral infection and understand the options for cure. We learned from our patients, expanded our programs, began lobbying Congress, pushing pharma and anyone who


would listen to do more. By conservative estimates, we have worked directly with 100,000 patients on every aspect of this pervasive disease through our HelpLine, support groups, educational programs, and health fairs.

Over our twenty-year history, we've grown into one of the most respected organizations in the U.S. working to eradicate hepatitis C. We decided to capitalize on that success and changed our name, logo, mission, and programs in 2016. So, stay tuned for our next chapter!

Restrictions to HCV Cures Requires Strong Advocacy Efforts

New direct acting antivirals have ushered in excitement about being cured of the hepatitis C virus. However, that excitement quickly turned to frustration because the prices of treatment set by the pharmaceutical companies were out of reach for most people. To control costs, insurance companies and public payers put up significant

restrictions, so that only the sickest had access to therapy. We believe that everyone deserves to be cured of HCV, so Hep C Connection went into "action" mode by testifying at public hearings, meeting with legislators, the Governor's staff, and Medicaid leadership, and by commissioning a study by the Center for Disease Analysis on the savings to Colorado by loosening restrictions so that more people in Medicaid may be cured. We were able to make the case to the Joint

Budget Committee of the Colorado General Assembly that treating people earlier in the disease progression will save Colorado money on the cost of care as well as reduce the costs of co-morbidities.

The World Health Organization and World Hepatitis Alliance invited us to the first ever World Hepatitis Summit in Glasgow, Scotland, where we learned from our colleagues throughout the 84 countries represented. The second World Hepatitis Summit will be held in Brazil in 2017.

As you can see from these efforts, we are committed to working locally, nationally and internationally so that everyone has an opportunity to achieve a cure.


